"Antagonistic Cooperation: Poetry, Prose, and American Poetics, 1830-2016"

"Antagonistic Cooperation" recovers the surprisingly recent history of the false dichotomy between poetry and prose in US literature. From 1830 to 2016, poetry is increasingly defined by its difference from prose despite an ongoing awareness of similarities between the two. The chapters in this book trace the growing fixation on this binary, beginning with Thoreau and proceeding with chapters on Frances Ellen Watkins Harper, William Carlos Williams, Elizabeth Bishop, and Claudia Rankine. I demonstrate that this dichotomy has prompted heated debates, sparked technical innovations, led to editing practices that obscure original texts, and sometimes enables impoverished readings of canonical volumes. Ultimately, I argue that these two predominating aesthetic categories, "poetry" and "prose," govern the way we read, study, teach, and interpret literature today.
